 Channel of public funds and institutions for the implementation of tasks, liquidation of competence mismatch and gaps at national and regional levels

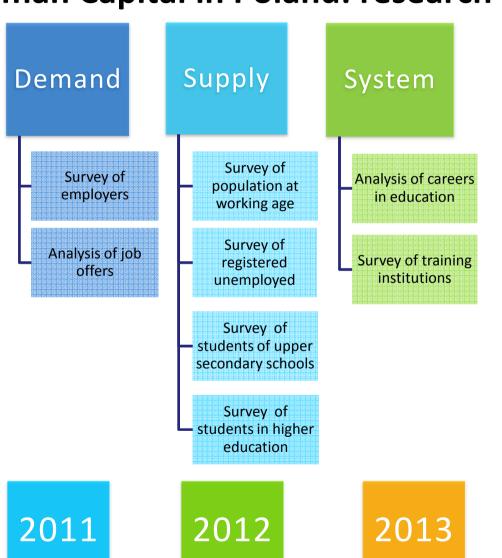
Strategic goal

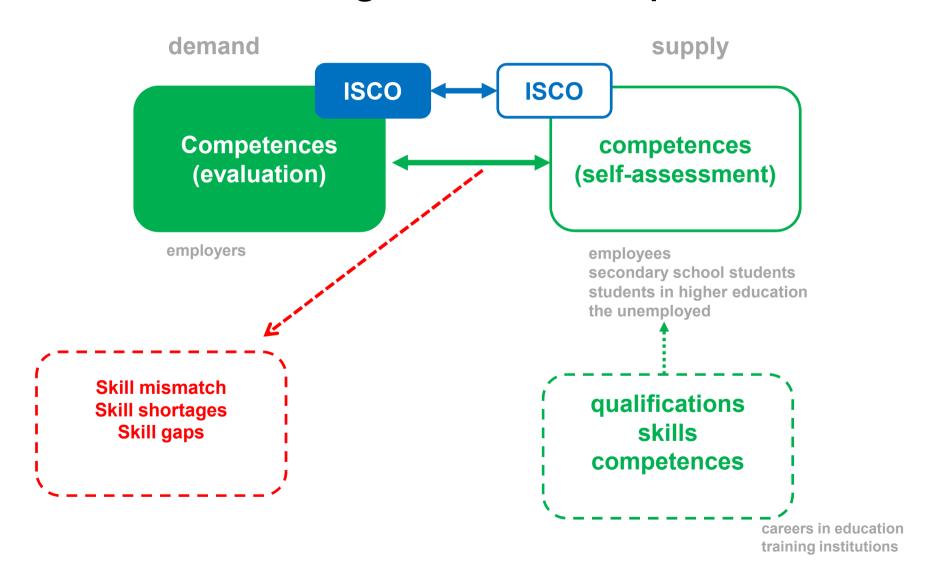

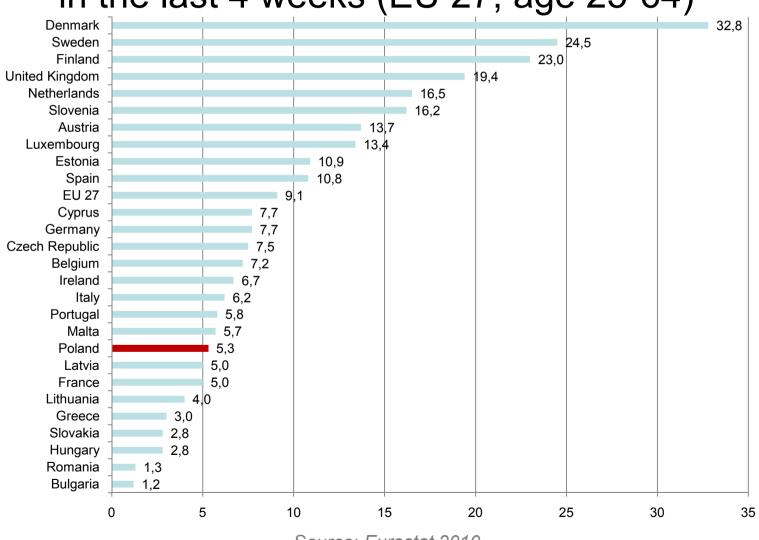
Model of diagnosis of competences





LIFELONG LEARNING IN POLAND: BASIC FACTS

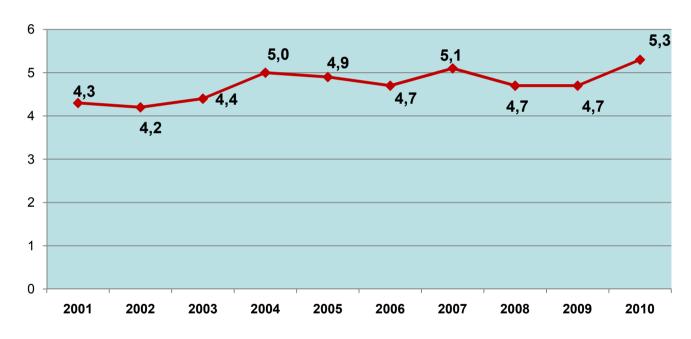
Participation in education and training in the last 4 weeks (EU 27, age 25-64)

Consistent, very low level of educational activity of adult Poles

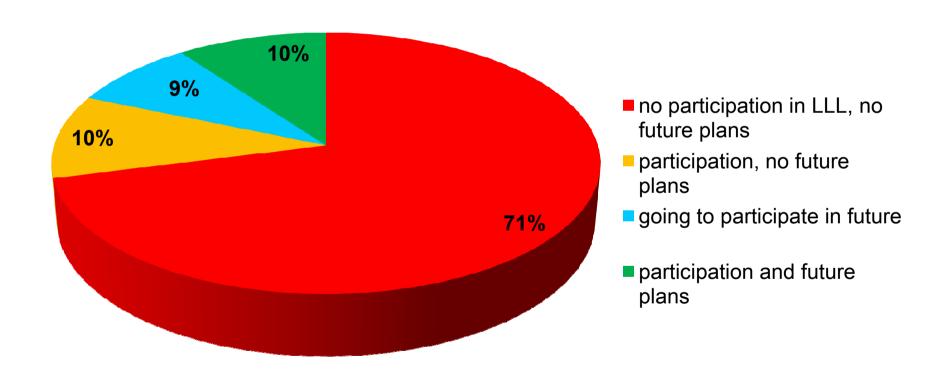


Participation in education and training in Poland:2001-2010

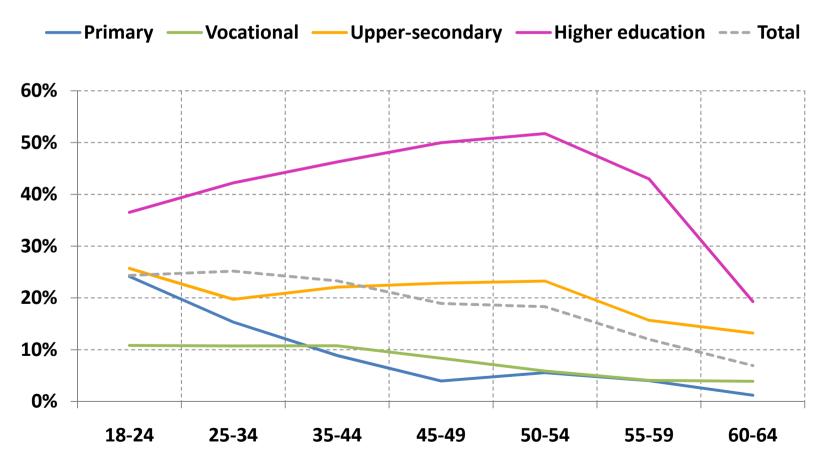
Learning activity of adult Poles in the last 12 months and future education plans

Reasons for not participating in education and training

	Working	Unemployed	Total
Did not need at work	82%	35%	63%
Had no time (personal reasons)	7%	14%	11%
Had no motivation	7%	19%	10%
Too old for learning	3%	8%	9%
High price	5%	19%	6%
Had no time (occupational reason)	9%	3%	6%
Lack of appriopriate trainings	4%	18%	5%
Health problems	1%	4%	5%
Other reasons	1%	5%	4%
Did not have the support of the employer	5%	5%	4%

Main problems and challenges

- A sustained very low level of educational activity among adult Poles: rare participation in courses and training, and infrequent development of competences through self-education.
- Selective character of participation in training and courses after completion of school education increasing competency disproportions between people with higher and lower qualifications.
- Strong links between education activity and age, and primarily lack of educational activity in older aged groups, increasing the risk of skills obsolescence and favouring the maintenance of a low level of labour activity among people 50+



Main problems and challenges

- The need for strategic action in the area of non-formal education; first of all, attempt to overcome such barriers as:
 - low learning culture among the adult population of Poles (especially the older, poorly educated population)
 - lack of occupational motivation to improve one's qualifications
 - existing problems in the training sector and its institutional environment, especially problems related to quality of services
- Awarding an appropriate rank to informal education, greater emphasis on learning at workplace, and on community learning.
