“MSCA at 30: Research Mobility & Bridging Gaps Across Europe” is a forward-looking, community-driven anniversary event marking three decades of the Marie Skłodowska-Curie Actions - one of Europe’s flagship instruments for research careers and talent circulation. Bringing together researchers, research managers, institutional leaders and policy actors, the event moves beyond celebratory narratives to focus on the practical realities of mobility, career development and institutional capacity across the European Research Area. Through a fully interactive programme combining keynote reflections, experience-based discussions and structured networking formats, participants engage directly with the challenges and opportunities shaping MSCA today - from talent circulation and return pathways to widening participation and strengthening research ecosystems - with the aim of translating collective experience into concrete recommendations for the future of the programme under Horizon Europe past 2028.

Wall of opportunities: Interactive networking space

An interactive, color-coded networking wall designed for researchers, project managers, institutional leaders, research support offices, and innovation actors actively seeking collaboration. Participants can post and browse concrete opportunities: researchers looking for host institutions or secondments; institutions offering postdoctoral positions or MSCA hosting capacity; project managers seeking consortium partners; universities and RPOs presenting strategic priorities; and mentors offering career guidance.

This structured format reduces networking inefficiency by making invisible needs visible. Instead of random encounters, participants can immediately identify relevant matches based on thematic focus, MSCA scheme, career stage, or institutional profile. Dedicated facilitation ensures quick introductions and targeted exchanges.

The wall will be photographed and shared with participants as a searchable digital catalogue of opportunities, extending the networking impact beyond the conference and supporting concrete follow-up collaborations.

Making MSCA works: career paths, institutions, and cross-border reality

Panellists share firsthand accounts of what actually worked - and what did not - in their MSCA journeys across Europe, with particular reflection on experiences in Poland, Hungary, Benelux region and Germany. Rather than presenting success stories alone, the discussion also explores critical decision points that shaped their trajectories.

How did recruitment and employment conditions influence mobility choices? Did supervision and mentoring structures meet expectations? What role did non-academic pathways play in career development, including intersectoral mobility and transitions between academia and industry? Which institutional support mechanisms - from grant offices to reintegration schemes - made a tangible difference? How do these benefits and trade-offs differ across countries and sectors and how do they affect research careers and collaborations?

By comparing experiences across different research ecosystems, the panel will investigate structural contrasts in working cultures, administrative capacity, funding landscapes, and career stability and will strive to answer if and how MSCA actions create opportunities for mutual learning, transfers of ideas and closing the disparities between R&I ecosystems. Particular attention will be given to varying levels of institutional support, administrative readiness, and career frameworks across countries.

The aim is to move beyond promotional narratives and extract concrete, transferable lessons for two key audiences: researchers planning MSCA applications and institutions designing sustainable support ecosystems. The session will conclude with a short synthesis identifying practical recommendations for both individual applicants and host organisations seeking to turn MSCA participation into long-term excellence gains.

Talent circulation, capacity building, research bridges: closing gaps with MSCA portfolio

This interactive fishbowl discussion explores how MSCA instruments can strengthen research capacity across the European Research Area while avoiding one-way brain drain. The conversation focuses on how researchers' mobility, collaborative networks and return pathways can transform individual fellowships into long-term institutional and regional impact. Four initial speakers briefly introduce perspectives from different R&I ecosystems, reflecting on questions such as: why talented researchers leave certain regions, what conditions would encourage their return, and which institutional practices help convert MSCA participation into sustainable capacity building. The format allows participants to actively join the discussion by taking an open seat, bringing new experiences and viewpoints into the conversation.

NAWA-MSCA Network: A practical model for return, reintegration and career support

A concrete demonstration of Poland's support infrastructure for MSCA researchers: who provides which services, how to access them, and where critical gaps remain. The session maps the complete researcher journey from initial idea through host identification, proposal development, mobility execution, and post-return reintegration, showing exactly which organization handles each step. This is not promotional material but a diagnostic tool. Participants see what support actually exists vs. what researchers still navigate alone, with real cases illustrating both successes and failures in the system.

MSCA Deep Dives: Focused Roundtables

This structured networking ensures clarity of purpose: participants know why others are in their zone and can quickly identify relevant contacts, while still allowing organic conversations to develop. Four speakers deliver concise, experience-based talks highlighting one practical lesson from their MSCA journey and its broader institutional or systemic impact. Moving beyond individual success stories, the session illustrates

how specific MSCA instruments contribute to strengthening the European Research Area — through talent circulation, intersectoral mobility, institutional learning, and capacity building. With particular attention to widening policy contexts, speakers will reflect on how MSCA participation can help reduce structural R&I gaps when embedded in strategic institutional approaches. A Q&A session will draw out transferable lessons for researchers, institutions, and policymakers — including perspectives relevant for FP10.

From Practice to Policy - From Today's Insights to Tomorrow's MSCA

The session closes the day with a synthesis of key insights and recommendations emerging from panels, roundtables, and networking discussions. The rapporteur presents a consolidated set of practical takeaways reflecting the perspectives of researchers, institutions, and research managers. Participants vote live on the priorities they consider most important for strengthening MSCA's contribution to the European Research Area and reducing R&I disparities across Europe. The session aims to connect community experience with policy reflection, ensuring the discussion contributes to shaping the future direction of MSCA beyond the conference

A high-level keynote guest will be invited to respond to the day's outcomes, reflects on MSCA's evolving role within ERA, and shares forward-looking perspectives on the programme's development under FP10.
